Valentine, a 20-year member of Sertoma, accepted the club's highest award for a member as "Sertoman of the Year." Her award was presented by her husband, Artie Valentine, a past officer, in an emotional presentation.

AUSTIN'S HOUSE FUNDRAISER: Four rock bands, comprised mostly of GE Energy employees, recently volunteered their talents at Indigo's Restaurant & Bar to raise almost \$6,000 for Austin's House, the only emergency children's shelter in rural Northern Nevada.

The Finance Department based at the GE Energy site in Minden organized the event that was dubbed "Austinpalooza."

Terry Palmitier, president of the board of directors at Austin's House and a local children's advocate, spoke about how children in crisis have been positively changed by the staff at Austin's House.

Children are placed at Austin's House after being removed from their homes because of abuse or neglect and had no place else to go.

Austin's House provides the basic living necessities, including proper nutrition, hygiene, rest, nurturing, recreation, companionship, education and life-skills training.

Austin's House has cared for more than 160 children since opening in September

2007.

SOROPTIMIST RUBY AWARD: Dr. Marcia Hoch of Reno is this year's recipient of the Soroptimist Inter-national of Truckee Meadows' "Soroptimist Ruby Award: For Women Helping Women."

She was selected for her commitment to facilitating services for women wishing to begin or continue their education.
